This course offers a basic foundation in business law and regulation in a variety of areas, including bankruptcy, employment, consumer and contract law. Instruction on ethics, social responsibility and technology is integrated throughout the course.

Course Objectives

1. Explain the framework of the U.S. legal system.
2. Analyze tort liability issues within the business environment.
3. Examine substantive and procedural aspects of criminal law in the business law context.
4. Assess the importance of agency relationships.
5. Apply federal legislation to given employment scenarios to evaluate how business is impacted.

6. Prepare an enforceable contract based on the provided facts.
7. Distinguish between real property and personal property.
8. Analyze situations of unethical behavior in the business environment.
9. Evaluate the various forms of business organizations.
10. Explain how a business can use the bankruptcy laws to liquidate or reorganize.
11. Debate the pros and cons of federal and state government regulation of business.
12. Identify international and world trade law sources.

SCANS Objectives

SCANS is an acronym for Secretary's Commission on Achieving Necessary Skills. The committee, created by the National Secretary of Labor in the early 1990s, created a list of skills and competencies that the committee feels are necessary for employees to function in a high-tech job market.

1. Identify relevant facts, analyze their accuracy, and study their effects on business transactions.
2. Recognize problems and devise and implement a plan of action to resolve them.
3. Demonstrate the ability to use authentic resources, including the Internet and knowledge libraries.
4. Select and analyze information and communicate results to others by using oral, written, graphic, pictorial, or multimedia methods.
5. Evaluate alternatives and choose the best one for a situation
6. Use a systematic problem-solving process to analyze and solve a problem.

7. Apply an ethical course of action to a given situation.
